

# **Supply Issues Bulletin**

## April/May 2014 (Vol 2, No. 4)

## **Please Circulate to All Staff**

A regular update bulletin which informs and advises GP Practices on the latest medicine supply problems and product discontinuations, with additional local advice on suggested actions or alternatives.

The information is collated from a range of sources.

Information on **product discontinuations** is collated using information received from manufacturers, and also online resources<sup>1</sup>.

**Intermittent supply problems** can occur due to either manufacturing issues causing shortages of **branded** products ('Manufacturer Cannot Supply', **MCS**) or supply issues affecting **generic** medicines, resulting in generics being difficult to obtain at Scottish Drug Tariff Part 7 (SDT) prices, or at all ('**Short Supply**', **SHS**).

Information on Part 7 generic medicines which are identified as being in short supply is published on a monthly basis in the form of SDT Part 13 and is updated throughout the month by ISD (<u>http://tinyurl.com/ScotDT</u>). Information is also available via the Community Pharmacy Scotland Website (<u>http://tinyurl.com/CPS-ShortagesInfo</u>). Inclusion in Part 13 allows Community Pharmacists to be reimbursed appropriately if higher costs are incurred in obtaining those Part 7 generics listed.

Supply issues are constantly in flux and your local Community Pharmacists will be able to give you up to date advice on availability.

The advice in this bulletin is not intended to serve as a standard of medical care or be applicable in every situation. Decisions regarding the treatment of individual patients must be made by the clinician in light of that patient's presenting clinical condition and with reference to current good medical practice.

Product	Current Supply Problem	Impact & Advice
Antabuse <sup>®</sup> (disulfiram) <b>200mg</b> tablets	Manufacturer experiencing further supply problems, a batch has gone out to wholesalers but next supply not expected until June 2014	Check availability with local community pharmacies. An imported product, disulfiram <b>500mg</b> tablets (Esperal <sup>®</sup> ) is available from IDIS. This product does not have a UK marketing authorisation - full prescribing responsibility lies with the prescriber. The Substance Misuse Service has advised that 250mg (half a tablet) may be an appropriate alternative dose for patients currently receiving 200mg tablet dose (Esperal <sup>®</sup> tablets are scored, allowing them to be halved). Any patients receiving the imported product should be advised of the new strength/dose. FVRH holds a small supply of the imported product. Further advice may be obtained from Substance Misuse Services (North Team 01786 434433; South Team 01324 673656).
Valsartan capsules and tablets (generic and branded Diovan <sup>®</sup> )	Currently supply problems with both the generic and branded capsules and tablets. Some pharmacies have reported some intermittent stock available in response to specific enquiries to wholesalers.	Where pharmacies are unable to source the product UKMI have provided guidance on switching to alternative ARBs: <u>http://tinyurl.com/UKMI-ValsartanAdvice</u> Prescribers will need to ascertain the most appropriate alternative treatment bearing in mind licensed indications and doses. Candestartan is first line ARB on the FV formulary and losartan is also on the formulary. Local cardiology opinion supports this approach.
Orphenadrine 50mg tablets	Temporary supply issues have been reported by some pharmacies.	Some pharmacies may have residual stocks or be able to obtain some supplies. Liquid is available. Where a change of therapy is required please contact the Mental Health Clinical Pharmacy Team for advice (Tel No 01324 566728 or 01324 566729).

#### **Resolved Supply Issues**

Clomipramine capsules (all strengths) are now available.

Mefenamic acid 500mg tablets are reported as being available again.

Nuelin SA<sup>®</sup> **250mg** tablets are now available. Hyoscine hydrobromide 150mcg & 300mcg (Kwells<sup>®</sup>) – supplies are now available. Patients who are currently prescribed pirenzepine or Scopoderm<sup>®</sup> for **hypersalivation** should be reviewed.

### **Discontinued Products**

Discontinued Product	FV Formulary & Advice
Glucophage <sup>®</sup> (Metformin) sachets	There is a licensed oral solution. It is NOT recommended that the tablets are crushed.
Macrodantin <sup>®</sup> 50mg capsules	Generic nitrofurantoin 50mg & 100mg capsules are available. <b>Prescribe by generic name. CAPSULES</b> are the most cost-effective formulation of nitrofurantoin.
Sanomigran <sup>®</sup> Elixir and 0.5mg tablets (pizotifen)	Generic Pitzotifen 0.5mg tablets are available – ensure prescribed by generic name. There is no alternative liquid formulation available but where an alternative drug is not an option for the patient, tablets may be crushed and mixed with water for administration (NEWT Guidelines (2 <sup>nd</sup> Edition)
Testosterone Implants 100mg & 200mg	Alternative testosterone preparations/formulations are available
Gopten <sup>®</sup> (trandolapril) capsules	Generic products are available – ensure prescriptions are written by generic name.
